



Alumni Spotlight: Hep B Founder: Kevin Hur

Hello VHIO volunteers!

My name is Kevin Hur and I am currently a 2nd year medical student at Johns Hopkins. I wasn't exactly a volunteer with VHIO when I was at Berkeley, but Amy Shen (cofounder and former director of SFHBC) was instrumental in helping me start the Hep B Project (HBP). When I was looking for someone to help me set up HBP, few organizations were willing to lend a hand to help me, this unknown undergrad, get started. However, Amy welcomed me with open arms and really provided me with a lot of support. She invited me to the SFHBC officer meetings to learn how to run a student organization, introduced me to other Hep B organizations, recruited amazing volunteers to join HBP, and helped me get funding. I was incredibly impressed by how well-run and effective SFHBC was, and I tried to emulate SFHBC's organizational structure when I started HBP the summer of 2009. It's safe to say the Hep B Project would not be where it is today if Amy and SFHBC did not show me the ropes, and for that I am incredibly grateful.



As for medical school, it's really gone by in a blur. There is a lot of material to learn and I always seem to be short on time, but it's not as stressful as I originally anticipated. That's because we have a P/F grading system the first 2 years of medical school, which I believe most med schools have adopted. One interesting (and fantastic) thing about medical school (especially at Johns Hopkins) is the plethora of opportunities outside of class, whether it be student organizations, volunteer opportunities, or research projects. I have several interests and it's really hard when I have to choose from so many wonderful opportunities. In med school here, I just e-mail a professor saying I'm interested in working on a project and I get an e-mail back within the hour asking me when I can start. I don't think I've had to fill out an application or submit a resume for any outside activity that I've done here in med school. Maybe that's the way it should be...what do you think?
