

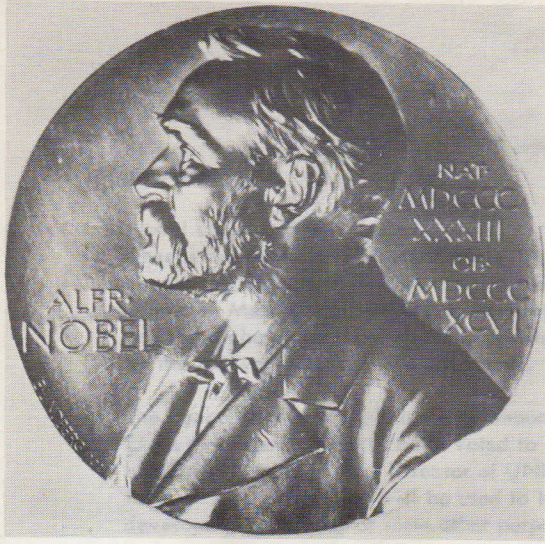

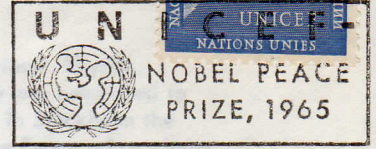

PRESENTED TO NOBEL PRIZE WINNERS

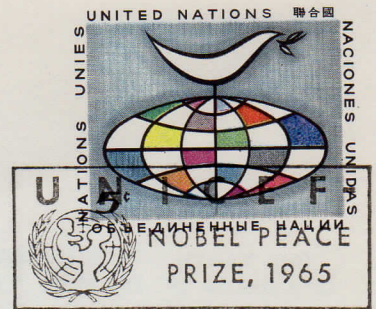

OSLO (AP)—The Nobel Peace Prize has been awarded to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF), the Nobel committee announced today. Originally UNICEF was formed to help child victims of the Second World War in Europe and Asia. Dec. 1, 1950, the UN assembly decided UNICEF should concentrate on children in underde-

UNICEF Wins Nobel Peace Prize

OSLO (AP) — UNICEF — The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund — has been awarded the 1965 Nobel Peace prize. The prize announced in Oslo today is worth about \$59,000. UNICEF first established in 1946 to help child victims of the Second World War.

The UN agency now concentrates in helping some of the children in underdeveloped countries. This is the fourth time the Nobel, the Norwegian Parliament has awarded the prize to the United Nations or its officials.

THE NOBEL PRIZES

Upon the death, in 1896, of Alfred Nobel, the famed Swedish engineer, it was revealed that, under his will, he had left the bulk of his fortune - over eight million dollars - to be set up as a Fund, the interest of which would go to those "who had conferred the greatest benefit on mankind during the preceding year."

Nobel stipulated that the prizes were to be awarded in five categories:- Physics, Chemistry, Medicine, Literature and Peace. The Swedish Academy was nominated to choose the winners in Physics and Chemistry; The Caroline Institute in Stockholm the winner in Medicine; The Swedish Academy, in Literature. Only the Peace prize winner was to be chosen by a non-Swedish Institution - namely a five member committee elected by the Norwegian Storting (Parliament).

The Peace Prize money, this year, amounts to approximately \$54,000. The thirty nation Executive Board of UNICEF has voted to use this money to establish a memorial fund honouring Maurice Pate, Director of UNICEF from its inception in 1946, until his death last January. This Fund will be used to train personnel for service with children in the developing countries, or some other purpose closely related to the work for UNICEF.

Henry R. Labouisse, Executive Director of UNICEF, will go to Oslo, Norway, Friday, December 10th, to receive the Prize.
