1. Is the best life always the one with the most pleasure and least pain?
2. What are the strengths and weaknesses of Bentham's utilitarian theory of punishment?
3. Explain Aristotle's argument that happiness is exercising the virtues.
4. What does Nietzsche mean when he says that morality is the result of a "slave revolt"? In what way is it a criticism of morality?
5. What is inconsistent about (what Williams calls) "vulgar relativism"?
6. Why is it, according to Hobbes, that the sovereign may *do* to us whatever he wants, but cannot *command* (or *obligate*) us to do whatever he wants?
7. When, according to Locke, are we obligated to a particular government? What are Hume's criticisms of this view?
8. What is the point of Nozick's "Wilt Chamberlain" example?
9. What is Rawls's argument for the "Democratic Equality" interpretation of his second principle of justice?
